



History of Lakeside Cemetery

Lakeside Cemetery was established in the 1840s, not long after the Libertyville area was settled.

The earliest graves date back to the Civil War era. Some of Libertyville's oldest pioneers are buried here including Tobias Wynkoop, Horace Butler, and Calvin Appley.

Several leading citizens of Libertyville filed with the Secretary of State to organize the Lakeside Cemetery Association on June 3, 1910.

Over the years, the Lakeside Cemetery Association has carefully improved and maintained the manicured cemetery nestled in the trees on Lake Street overlooking Butler Lake.

PIONEERS



1. Dr. John L. Taylor

Served 43 years as the Lake County coroner and delivered more than 3,000 babies in his medical practice.



4. Horace Butler

Arrived in Libertyville 1837. First lawyer to practice in Lake County. Two-time postmaster, justice of the peace, probate justice.



2. J.B. Morse

J. B. Morse ran a clothing store for 33 years, was mayor of Libertyville, and served 40 years in Lake County government.



5. William Crane

Arrived in Libertyville in 1836. Operated a flour mill and saw mill on Lake Street/Milwaukee Ave. First Libertyville Township Supervisor.



3. Clara Colby

The first woman to vote after Illinois granted women limited voting rights in 1913.



6. Mabelle McGuffin

Alpha Club leader. Promoted formation of local library. Elected to first library board.
